VIETNAM TO INDIANTOWN GAP: OUR REFUGEE CAMP EXPERIENCES (1975)

In 2019 at a CCAL Facilitators' Luncheon Bill Simons and Cynthia Walton-Leavitt discovered that they both worked at Indiantown Gap in 1975 in different capacities. The course will offer an historical context of American involvement in Vietnam leading up to the fall of Saigon in 1975, the U.S. debate about admitting Vietnamese refugees, and the establishment of a refugee camp at Indiantown Gap. As participant observers, Cynthia and Bill will share their reflections about Fort Indiantown Gap, including camp rules and organization,

goals, living conditions, daily and special activities, morale, the impact of refugee age, gender, and past circumstances, and Vietnamese-American relations.

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CAN NEW YORK SAVE THE CLIMATE WITHOUT DESTROYING THE ENVIRONMENT AND COMMUNITIES?

New York State's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act mandates that our electric grid be carbon free by 2040. The New York Energy Research and Development Authority's plan is to achieve this through the installation of industrial solar and wind farms across upstate New York, along with sprawling transmission lines and giant batteries. But intermittent renewable resources do not necessarily reduce our need for fossil-fuel power plants. Gas power plants must provide dispatchable backup for solar and wind – critical when the sun's not shining and the wind's not blowing.

Local interest in the subject is particularly high as rural upstate is being targeted to provide "green" energy to New York City. Upstate New York already has a 90% carbon-free grid, thanks to hydropower on the Niagara and St. Lawrence rivers, and nuclear power plants on Lake Ontario. Meanwhile, the downstate metro region is over 90% powered by fossil fuels.

The state's analysis ignores not only reliability issues, but the ecological impact of such a massive buildout, as well as the cost to taxpayers and ratepayers. The talk will examine similar efforts in California and Germany and highlight the rising opposition to New York's current accelerated renewable-siting process. NYS's 94-C, passed in 2019, can ignore full environmental review and local laws in order to site industrial solar and wind projects, effectively voiding home rule. In this context, the presentation reviews the independent system operator's (NYISO's) recent analyses of grid reliability as the buildout of solar and wind resources moves forward. Wouldn't it be a mistake to pursue a flawed energy plan that sacrifices nature, increases energy costs, compromises rural quality of life yet does little to decarbonize the grid? The presentation includes discussion of alternative ways to build a carbon-free grid.

DISCUSSION OF POVERTY, BY AMERICA BY MATTHEW DESMOND

The class will discuss sociologist and Pulitzer Prize winning author Mathew Desmond's recent book on poverty in this country. Lyndon Johnson declared war on poverty in the 1960s, but overall during the last half century poverty rates in this country have remained stable and higher than in other industrial countries. Why? The usual explanations are structural (globalization, technology, etc.) or blame the poor (lack of work ethic, family structure, etc.). Desmond argues that poverty persists because the non-poor middle class and wealthy benefit from poverty and allow it to continue through the policies of the officials we elect and the decisions we make as consumers and home owners. A review of the book in the New Yorker said "its moral force is a gut punch." This readable and short book (less than 200 pages of text with about 75 pages of footnotes, if you want more detail) should provide a basis for lively discussion. Note this class was moved from Fall 2023 to Winter 2024.
